Graduating just nine seniors this past spring, our membership count holds steady.

Currently, Gamma-Xi has the 3rd highest cumulative GPA amongst all other national fraternities on campus. Academics performance continues to be a top priority for the brothers. **George Park** ended the first semester with the chapter's highest GPA, at 3.95. In addition, Brothers **Casey Cempre** and **Grant Veltman** were honored as two of the Top 50 Scholar-Athletes.

Fraternity Pulls Together Under DU Scrutiny

I would like to bring the Kappa Sigma alumni up-to-date regarding the 2013 spring semester's events. These events are part of an on-going interaction between the Denison University administration and Gamma-Xi chapter.

Over the last 40 years, I have seen many run-ins between the chapter and Denison's department of student life/student affairs/student development. Most have been over infractions regarding alcohol or parties. The traditional punishment has been a suspension of social activities and in some cases workshops on risk management. The cases have typically been carried out without recorded investigations and hearings, and with poor documentation of charges and outcomes. I have not written of these incidents to alumni since they were somewhat ordinary.

More recently, however, the shift has been

to scrutinizing the chapter for "violations of student conduct," principally *hazing*. The stakes have gone up as charges result in house activities being suspended while an investigation goes on, and a guilty charge can result in a loss of the chapter's charter, as it did in 2004.

You may remember the 2004 charge of hazing resulted from a car accident involving four pledges that were on their way to DC to visit alumni. No one was hurt, but the father of the driver threatened suits to DU and National for the cost of the car. The trip was not chapter mandated, but because it was allowed to happen, it fell under the hazing definition since pledges were "placed in harm's way." Our Alumni Board challenged the decision, but the result was still a mutual decision on the part of Denison and National to remove the charter for

THE GAMMA-XI DIFFERENCE: IN YOUR WORDS

We asked several alumni to tell us about the impact Kappa Sig and the fraternity experience had on their lives. Here's what they said:

Through Gamma-Xi, I got many jobs. Each job seemed to lead to another—19 in all. I had turned pro in 1939, so I could not be on the golf team. However, I could teach the girls and give a hand to the normal took care of the horses at the College Barn for Al Morgan and exercised horses for Sally Jones and Vince Hitt. I lived in Curtis my first year, Talbot my second. I made money as head waiter at the lower Sem as student assistant in Biology,

and free room for being student dorm monitor. I left when the war started but had enough pre-med credits to use after my stint as Navy corpsman. Without the fraternity, I don't believe my future would have been so fulfilling. - Richard R. Royer '45

The friendships that were forged during my Kappa Sigma experience have, in many cases, turned out to be lifelong friendships that have been deep and meaningful. It was not the Kappa Sigma experience, per se, but rather the group of people that chose to come together as a family of sorts during that time and place. When religious intolerance briefly surfaced from a national KZ representative, I was awed by those who stood up and said it was not acceptable in our house. I remember being incredibly more by those who stood up and said no; many of whom I had not previously felt close to. That changed my perception, not only of those people, but also of how we humans bring our own internal discretionary judgments and perspectives to a given situation and of how, for the greater good, it is effective to view life from wider perspectives. - James A. four years pending the then current members graduation.

Our chapter returned in February, 2011 and has been thriving in a newly renovated house with the help of improved attention from the National Fraternity, local alumni advisors, and solid chapter leadership.

This brings us to February 26, 2013, when the University again leveled charges of "violations of student conduct." The charges carried with them the immediate suspension of all chapter activities including access to the lodge (bottom floor) and a prohibition of all gatherings including weekly chapter meetings. The suspension of all activities was unprecedented as was the publication of the chapter's suspension on both Denison's website and Wikipedia. Denison also contacted Kappa Sigma National which resulted in a further suspension and subsequent investigation.

The chapter never resumed activities for the remainder of the semester but **has been cleared of all hazing charges.** The Board was very involved because of the serious nature of the charges and even sought legal consul when the University broke into the house closet and removed ritual items.

The nature of Denison's approach is the impetus of this article. It was based on the search of a sophomore's room for marijuana in which a notebook was confiscated. The notebook contained ideas for pledge activities, some of which would have been considered hazing.

The charges resulted in two investigations, first by the alumni advisor and myself, then a team from National. As mentioned, Denison Security also searched the chapter house including the break-in of a privately locked closet. There were two documented security reports produced. The final outcome was a dropping of all hazing charges by Denison and National, with a year of National Trusteeship over a drinking violation uncovered during the investigations. I wrote a letter to Denison on the Board's behalf and included a legal opinion from our lawyer.

The Board was quite upset by the details of this incident including what we saw as a violation of Fourth Amendment rights on the part of the student and toward the house corporation. We are frankly concerned that it represents a more aggressive strategy by DU toward fraternities, but will keep a cautiously optimistic attitude.

Rather than go into more detail here, I invite you to visit the Kappa Sigma at Denison website (www.kappasigmadenison. com), where we have placed all the surrounding documentation for you to read, including the Board's response. In order to keep this information as private as possible, you will need to get a site ID and password in order to view the many documents relating to these incidents. Finally, I would like to acknowledge the great support from Kappa Sigma National, including Toby Taylor and especially that of Mic Wilson, Executive Director. Mic has been a dedicated supporter of Gamma-Xi as long as I can remember, from before the 1995 decision to go non-residential, through our recolonization effort. He deeply cares about our chapter.

The Homes of Gamma-Xi – Then and Now

Kappa Sigma and Beta Alpha Delta have called five houses "home" over the years. Each

has had a special place in the hearts of those who lived in it and is filled with memories of undergraduate days and alumni reunions at Denison. Each move meant more room and better facilities as the

chapter grew and the Alumni Association

developed. It was a long way from the little house on Cherry Street to the beautiful home

on the College Hill, built for the chapter by her own alumni. All of the former houses are still standing in Granville, although three have been considerably remodeled.

The first real home of Beta Alpha Delta, on the southwest corner of Cherry and Elm

Streets, was rented after three years in Talbot

Hall. It was so small that only four brothers could room there, but the new fraternity was now in its own chapter house. The years here marked the development of Beta Alpha Delta into a strong local fraternity, eagerly accepted into Kappa Sigma. Today, the house is just barely recognizable, having gone through extensive remodeling and enlargement over the years.
